

Advocacy Legalese

Dos and Don'ts for Advocacy & Civic Engagement at Health Centers

Personal Activity vs. Health Center Activity

- Activities/statements by directors, staff, or volunteers acting on their own behalf (own time, own resources) are not restricted, but you cannot use organizational resources nor have the organization associated or identified with the activities.
- Written policies for staff (including volunteers) are critical and should include:
 - Workplace activity
 - Use of center resources
 - Social media

Health Center Activity

- Charge voter registration costs, including employee time and appropriate overhead, to the health center "non-grant" or program income revenue.
- Make sure to include all associated costs such as the cost of printing flyers, signs, handouts, etc., in your calculation of voter registration costs and be sure to include associated indirect or administrative costs.



Political Campaign Activity vs. Personal Activity

Leaders should not make partisan comments in official organization publications or at official functions of the organization


- Does individual say he/she is speaking on behalf of the organization?
- Does an individual's endorsement/opposition occur at the organization, or during an official meeting (e.g., Board meeting)?
- Does an individual's endorsement/opposition use the organization's resources (e.g., telephones, stationary)?

"The political campaign intervention prohibition is not intended to restrict free expression on political matters by leaders of organizations speaking for themselves, as individuals. Nor are leaders prohibited from speaking about important issues of public policy." IRS Revenue Ruling

Political Campaign Advocacy

- Intervening in a political campaign
- Participation can = intervention

Entirely prohibited



Engaging with Candidates

Do:

- Engage all candidates (yes, ALL of them!)
- Stay nonpartisan
- Host candidate forums to discuss the issues
- Educate them on the Health Center Program
- Interact with official social media profiles (if a sitting elected official)
- Get involved with voter registration activities

Don't:

- Support one candidate or party over another
- Engage in any campaign activity as an organization or as a representative of your Health Center (even if you are approached by the candidate)
- Interact with a candidate's campaign accounts on social media
- Tell your patients who to vote for (even if they ask!)

A Health Center Cannot...

Support or oppose candidates for elective office (although you personally can).

Use federal grant dollars for lobbying or voter registration

Endorse or oppose a candidate—implicit or explicit.

Contribute money, time, or facilities to a candidate.

Coordinate activities with a candidate.

YES, you can!

RegisterVoters

- Drives must be designed to educate the public about the importance of voting.
- Activities cannot be biased for or against any candidate or party.
- Nonprofits may target registration and turnout efforts to the areas or people they serve.

Educate Voters

- Educate the public on issues and encourage participation in the political process.
- Educate all candidates and political parties on your issues.
- Conduct or participate in a nonpartisan candidate forum. The forum must be open to all candidates, be run in a balanced way, and include a broad range of nonpartisan questions for the candidates.
- Make presentations on your organization's issue to platform committees, campaign staff, candidates, media, and the general public.

Voter Registration Guidelines

Choosing a Focus

You **CAN** focus efforts on historically oppressed and repressed populations

You **CANNOT** focus on ideological groups: liberal, conservatives, etc.

Choosing a Geographic Area

You **CAN** focus on an area because it has historically low voter turnout

You CANNOT focus on an area because it has a close race
