History

- In 1994, the Florida Legislature passed the Holocaust Education Bill (SB 660) amending section 233.061 of Florida Statutes to require all school districts to incorporate lessons on the Holocaust as part of public school instruction.
 - The Commissioner of Education created a Task Force on Holocaust Education.
 - The Task Force is an advisory to the Commissioner of Education and coordinates Holocaust education activities and provide Professional Development Opportunities for teachers on his behalf.
 - 10 Task Force sites in Florida to provide Professional Development Teacher Training with Subject Matter Experts.



Section 1003.42(2)(g), Florida Statutes

- Required Instruction:
 - Public schools "shall teach efficiently and faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet the highest standards for professionalism and historical accuracy, following the prescribed courses of study, and employing approved methods of instruction, the following:
 - "The history of the Holocaust (1933-1945), the systematic, planned annihilation of European Jews and other groups by Nazi Germany, a watershed event in the history of humanity, to be taught in a manner that leads to an investigation of human behavior, an understanding of the ramifications of prejudice, racism, and stereotyping, and an examination of what it means to be a responsible and respectful person, for the purposes of encouraging tolerance of diversity in a pluralistic society and for nurturing and protecting democratic values and institutions."




HB 1213 – Educational Instruction of Historical Events

 Revises the requirement to teach Holocaust education to include instruction concerning antisemitism; requires school districts to report Holocaust education instruction annually to the Department of Education; requires the Department to prepare and offer Holocaust education standards and curriculum; and designates second week in November as "Holocaust Education Week"



In Summary, the Task Force Exists to Connect Actual Instruction to Requirements in Law






Membership

Commemorated widely, it remains relevant to anyone interested in understanding the evolution of hate. The Nazi Titanic: The Incredible Untold Story of a Doomed Ship in World War II. Built in 1927, the German ocean liner SS Cap Arcona was the greatest ship since the RMS Titanic and one of the most celebrated luxury liners in the world. When the Nazis seized control in Germany, she was stripped down for use as a floating barracks and troop transport. In the Third Reich's final days, the ill-fated ship was packed with thousands of concentration camp prisoners. Just days before Germany surrendered, the Cap Arcona was mistakenly bombed by the British Royal Air Force and nearly all of the concentration camp prisoners were killed in the last major tragedy of the Holocaust.

PART 1: Teaching About Religion in the Classroom

Anti-religious sentiment is on the uptick in the United States and Europe. Education about and exposure to the world's religious traditions are critical for students as they become global citizens. Where does antisemitism come from? to help students understand the origins and history of the "longest hatred" for both the study of the Holocaust and events today.

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


Task Force partners with FLVS
