Dale has a problem with his blood. He has multiple myeloma—a sort of bone marrow cancer. (Please do not correct us; just let us make our point.) As medical laymen, we do not understand all the ins and outs of what the disease is, just that it can be fatal if left untreated. So, we are heading home in order to receive treatment and, if it is God's will, a healing of Dale's blood.

Blood is a universal truth. Everybody has it. In fact, if you run out of it, you die. That is because blood carries oxygen, nutrients, and other needed items—both coming and going. So, diseases of the blood are serious business! Better get those cured or at least in remission.

How different is the blood of Jesus. Recently, in an online blog by a Christian, the argument was made that we get too hung up on the blood of Christ, especially in our hymnody. What a strange observation, especially when you consider the blood of all those sacrifices and the blood that hallowed God's people. (There are 85 references to blood in Leviticus alone!) There is John's reference to the flood of blood and water that came from the side of the dead Christ. And John in his greetings to the seven churches in the Revelation says: *To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood ... be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen* (Rev. 1:5-6 ESV.)

It is Christ's blood that sees us through all our trials. It assures us of heaven. It helps us take our stand against all evil that may come against us. It is the cure that every sinner needs; because, by it, we are cleansed from all sin. And so, the Lord speaks to us: "Take, drink"

The blood of Jesus is a purifying flood. That is what we have been sent to proclaim as the great medicine for every person. And though we may have to go home for a while, we are going to keep proclaiming it. We will still be teaching it online, and we will still be seeing to its proclamation from the pulpit at St. Michael the Archangel in Prague. But who knows whom the Lord will put on our path? Perhaps, there is a member of our medical team who needs to hear about this blood. Perhaps, it is people we will meet in waiting rooms. It can be whomever and wherever the Lord leads us. We may not know where the road passes through, and we do not know what will be along the way. But the road that God puts every Christian on is the road that leads to His eternal and glorious kingdom where we will meet the One who shed His blood for us. Thanks be to God!
