### **MEMORANDUM**

To: Members of the Board of Education

From: Patricia B. O'Neill, Chair, Board of Education Policy Management Committee

Subject: Final Action, Board Policy IQD, Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities

On November 10, 2020, the Montgomery County Board of Education tentatively adopted revised draft Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities* (Resolution No. 493-20). The tentatively adopted policy was distributed for public comment from November 12, 2020, until February 12, 2021. After review of the public comments on February 25, 2021, the Board of Education Policy Management Committee (Committee) recommends the "Committee Recommended Draft" that will be discussed by the full Board today.

The Committee Recommended Draft is included as Attachment A, a Summary of Public Comments is included as Attachment B, the public comments are included as Attachment C, and the July 11, 2019, resolution requesting that the Committee review Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, (Resolution No. 446-19), is included as Attachment D.

The Committee now is recommending that the proposed amendments to Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, be approved.

The following resolution is provided for your consideration:

WHEREAS, A July 11, 2019, resolution requesting that the Board's Policy Management Committee review Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, and consider bringing forward a recommendation the Board of Education (Resolution No. 446-19); and

WHEREAS, Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, encourages student engagement in school through a variety of extracurricular activities including, but not limited to, interscholastic sports, student government, fine arts, academic teams, and other group activities as an essential part of a complete educational experience; and

WHEREAS, Policy IQD, Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities, reaffirms the commitment of the Montgomery County Board of Education to providing an array of extracurricular opportunities, with and without academic eligibility requirements; and

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WHEREAS, The Board of Education seeks to balance state and collegiate expectations for academic attainment for interscholastic athletes while also setting forth academic eligibility requirements that are supportive of broad student engagement; and

WHEREAS, Policy IQD, Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities, sets forth academic eligibility requirements for students participating in interscholastic sports, with certain exemptions from these requirements for middle school students in the first marking period of their first year of middle school, and for high school students in the first three marking periods of their first year of high school; and

WHEREAS, Draft Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, was reviewed by the Policy Management Committee on February 18, 2020, and February 25, 2021; and

WHEREAS, Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, tentatively was adopted by the Board of Education on November 10, 2020, (Resolution No. 493-20), and sent out for public comment; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Education has received comments from the public and the Policy Management Committee's recommendations; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education adopt Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, as updated in the attached Committee Recommended Draft.

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30 B. ISSUE

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32 1. Research has shown that participation in extra-33 curricular activities -

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- 35 a) leads to improved academic performance;
- 36 b) enhances persistence to graduation;
- 37 c) supports students as they explore interests and 38 create broader perspectives;
  - d) promotes higher self-esteem; and
  - e) teaches essential life skills.

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2. Extracurricular activities, including interscholastic sports, are a valuable part of the entire education of each student and are often cited among the key factors to helping students stay engaged in school along with a supportive staff, friendly and positive relationships, and the ability to understand the work. Extra-curricular activities help students relationships, obtain assistance with homework, learn how to navigate the school and community cultures, and enhance a sense of belonging to their school community.

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3. Participation in extra-curricular activities has also been shown to result in improved school attendance.

Positively interacting with peers and adults outside the classroom, such as in after-school clubs and

interscholastic sports, facilitate building the relationships vital to a student's emotional, social, and intellectual development and overall school success.

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61 C. POSITION

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63 1. The Board supports having both extracurricular 64 requiring eligibility activities academic and 65 extracurricular activities predicated upon open 66 enrollment.

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2. The Board recognizes that participation in extracurricular activities should be maintained and supported by academic standards but does not desire to impede a student's participation in an activity that could be the key to their continued engagement in school.

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2.3. The Board seeks to balance the state and collegiate expectations with its interest in making extracurricular activities, including interscholastic sports, accessible to as many students as possible; hence, the Board sets forth below academic eligibility requirements that are supportive of broad student engagement. Extracurricular activities are a valuable part of the entire education of each student. However, participation in extracurricular activities should be maintained and supported by academic standards.

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Academic eligibility standards for middle and high a) school participation in athletic extracurricular activities are necessary to prepare students for participation in athletic competitions at state-wide level and to prepare them to meet the academic eligibility standards requirements at the collegiate level, should they desire to pursue sports beyond high school; therefore, academic standards .listed as stipendeligibility compensated activities in the negotiated Agreement Between Montgomery County Education Association and the Montgomery County Board of Education (hereafter referred to as the Agreement) must be established and communicated.

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b) Decisions regarding a student's academic eligibility for participation in interscholastic sports, as listed in the MCPS Middle School Athletic Handbook and the MCPS High School Athletic Handbookextracurricular activities will be made as follows:

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(1) Students in middle and high schools must maintain a 2.0 average with no more than one failing grade in the previous marking period to be eligible to participate in interscholastic sports. any activity listed as

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145 D. DESIRED OUTCOMES

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Each student should maintain high academic standards while also pursuing extracurricular activities that contribute to a well-rounded education.

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#### 151 E. IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES

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1. All middle and high schools should provide and communicate opportunities for all students to participate in extracurricular activities. by ensuring that there are a range of possibilities, including extracurricular activities with open enrollment that do not require academic eligibility.

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160 2. Schools should help students retain or regain academic 161 eligibility for all extracurricular activities requiring 162 academic eligibility by providing and referring students 163 to such support activities as intervention plans, 164 contracts, tutoring programs, mentoring and monitoring 165 programs, academic support classes and counseling, study 166 halls during or after school, outreach programs and/or 167 other programs.

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169 3. Schools should share best practices that increase

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#### 179 F. REVIEW AND REPORTING

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1. The superintendent **of schools** will report annually to the Board on high school academic ineligibility rates disaggregated by grade level, race/ethnicity, gender, and receipt of special services in the Annual Report.

### **Topics addressed in comments:**

- Standards should not preclude students to have opportunities for extracurricular activities as an opportunity for school involvement and "a healthy distraction from their stressful lives."
  - Students who struggle academically do better when they are permitted to remain involved in team sports.
  - Extracurricular activities may be the only arena in which they experience success and self-worth.
- Standards for participation should be higher so that students learn consequences for not doing well in school.
  - o Eligibility rules should apply starting in grade 9.
  - Students should be provided additional counseling and support in middle school so they are ready for success in high school.
- Academic eligibility requirements after resumption of in person instruction [after COVID] should be given special consideration.
- The policy may have implications for NCAA scholarship eligibility.

However, those students who come from low-income backgrounds balance their school work, often jobs outside of school to help their families, as well as family responsibilities, such as cooking or raising their younger siblings while parents work. With their full plates already, their grades might suffer. If they are involved in extracurricular activities and that is their only opportunity for school involvement or serves as a healthy distraction from their stressful lives, why would we take that away? When we think about the audit being conducted by MCPS, I would want to know many black and brown children are not doing well in school and involved in sports or other extracurricular activities. We have to consider the privilege most students have in only having to worry about school and extra curricular activities while other students have much more on their plate. Would this cause further inequity? Would this alienate black and brown students further? Thank you.

First, there is a great deal of research highlighting that students who struggle academically perform BETTER when they are permitted to remain involved in team sports. Second, for many students and especially those who struggle academically, extracurricular activities are the only arena where they are able to experience success and selfworth. For those students, participation in their activities and sports is necessary to buffer them from the depression their academic failures cause and so, is key to their mental and therefore physical health.

Without getting into my extensive background, what MCPS is looking to do is to create an NCAA rule on scholarship eligibility. For years, minorities sued the NCAA for its requirements to participate in sports as well as arguing the SAT discriminated. I do not think the BOD should make a decision without reading the history of the NCAA and how they expanded athletic opportunities. Secondly, high school athletics is a business. While you do not think so, it is a business. The NFL, MLB, NHL and the like rely on the high school farm system to feed their pipelines, with less than 1% every making the professional level. To come at this problem with the view of 'better access' is misguided. Do not make this decision without experts, like myself, in the room. It is not a cut and dry decision of access to more.

We know that many more students than normal are failing classes right now because online instruction is not an effective means of learning for large numbers of students. These students will be at risk of dropping out but having sports to look forward to might keep them engaged. I also do not understand why 6th graders are not allowed to participate in interscholastic sports. It seems like interscholastic sports for new middle schoolers could be an important way to keep kids healthy, physically active and engaged in school as they move from smaller and more personal elementary schools to the very large middle schools in MoCo.

### **MEMORANDUM**

Subject: Referral to Policy Management Committee: Eligibility

WHEREAS, The Montgomery County Board of Education has articulated a long standing commitment to foster student engagement through rigorous and relevant curriculum, engaging instruction, a variety of programs, and an array of extracurricular activities; and

WHEREAS, Board Policy IQD, Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities, states "[h]aving a variety of extracurricular options including, but not limited to, cultural arts, athletics, and other team activities is an essential part of a complete educational experience. The Board supports having both extracurricular activities requiring academic eligibility and extracurricular activities predicated upon open enrollment"; and

WHEREAS, Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, also states "[s]chools should help students retain or regain eligibility for all extracurricular activities requiring academic eligibility by providing and referring students to such support activities as contracts, tutoring programs, mentoring and monitoring programs, academic support classes and counseling, study halls during or afterschool, outreach programs and/or other programs"; and

WHEREAS, Under Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, extracurricular activities are linked to academic standards with the promise that the school system will make supports for maintaining academic performance and academic eligibility available to students. However, often students who are disengaged from school also are academically ineligible to participate in many extracurricular activities, and their inability to participate in numerous extracurricular activities can make reengagement difficult; and

WHEREAS, The Board's Policy Management Committee is charged with reviewing policy and bring forth recommendations to the full Board of Education members; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education requests that the Board's Policy Management Committee review Board Policy IQD, *Academic Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities*, benchmark with similarly situated school systems, review system data on eligibility, and consider bringing forward a recommendation to the Board of Education during the 2019–2020 school.

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
