

Opportunities for Both Partners: the LCMS & EECMY

Covington, LA—A few days ago as we were coming home from our last mission presentation, my ten year old daughter Rachael said, “The more times I attend these presentations, the more excited I get about going to Ethiopia!” I agree with her. Every time we present, I am reminded again of the incredible opportunity our Lord has placed before the LCMS.

The Ethiopian Lutheran Church (EECMY) is now the largest Lutheran church body in the world and they are continuing to grow at an astounding rate (almost 1 million new members/year). As their growth suggests, they have a very strong commitment to evangelism, outreach and international mission work. Add to that the fact that Ethiopia is a leader among the African nations and we can see that the EECMY is poised to be a leading voice and influential example among not only the African Lutheran churches, but worldwide Lutheranism.

We are now partnered with them in their efforts at pastoral education and formation. We have been and will continue to send professors on short-term teaching assignments to their seminaries. Now, with calls to Rev. Rabe and myself, we are placing long-term professors in Mekane Yesus Seminary in Addis Ababa. God willing, we will continue to expand that team. In addition to our teaching in Ethiopia, we are also bringing many EECMY professors and church leaders here to do graduate studies at our seminaries.

In this way, we, the LCMS, have been blessed with the opportunity to contribute to the theological training and doctrine of the Lutheran church that is poised to drive the shape of Lutheranism in all of Africa and from there, into the world...even as we have the chance to learn from them about evangelism and outreach, something they obviously excel at. Rachael is right—we do have a lot to be excited about.

Written in Amharic it would look like this : ኢንደሚን አለሁ: As in most languages, this phrase is used more as a greeting or part of a greeting rather than as an enquiry about your health.
