God's timing is a mysterious thing. In many of my newsletters, I've talked about trusting in God and His perfect timing because He always has our best interests in mind. God's timing and plans are always perfect but sometimes what God has planned for us hurts. A few weeks ago, my life suddenly and unexpectedly changed. As my dad was leading worship, he collapsed and was rushed to the hospital where he died a couple hours later. My dad knew Jesus as His Lord and Savior, and I know he is with Jesus now. But it hurts. God's timing is perfect, and it was in God's timing for my dad to leave this earth and be with his Heavenly Father. But it still hurts. Death and sin are some of the troubles we see over and over again in this broken world. They are painful and in the midst of grief, it is sometimes hard to see God's love and faithfulness. One of my favorite Easter texts is John 20:10-18. Mary Magdalene is at the empty tomb, weeping. She sees a man she assumes is the gardener but is actually her risen Lord! Jesus comes to her and comforts her and turns her grief into joy. Even in the midst of sadness and uncertainty, God still loves us and cares deeply for us. He is still working for our good. It may be hard to see through all the grief, but I know someday I'll be able to look back and see how God was using this time of immense sadness not just for my good, but for the good of so many others. And I know, just as He did for Mary Magdalene, God will turn our grief into joy.

My dad was one of my greatest supporters as I began the journey to become a missionary.
