Various Lessons to Learn

We spent May learning a variety of things. We continue daily study of

Swahili and now use it to speak with the staff, the cook, Obadia, his wife, shamwe and Francisco, a maintenance worker who is studying to be a teacher.

Vance wrote a sermon in Swahili and


the grammar and vocabulary were corrected by Francisco. The sermon, on the parable of the sower and the seed, emphasizes that despite difficulties, God's word does its good work in us. Vance now has another sermon and hopes to discuss it with Francisco. It is about the raising of Lazarus and emphasizes that God may allow suffering even for those He loves but uses it for His purposes; and by the power of His word alone He gives us faith and spiritual life. Francisco was listening to a sermon the other day on his phone. We didn't catch many words, but it was all shouting and we heard "Acha!" ("Stop it!") a lot. What might he think of Vance's sermons?

We completed another module of our on-line mission course through

Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne. We also took a week-long course on culture shock. Linda and Robyn are doing an on-line Bible study with other women of our mission region. We did several online classes on Community Health

Education and on using media for communication.

Bible reflection

On Pentecost, Peter stood up and preached a powerful sermon to his fellow Jews about Jesus' death and resurrection. Thousands of people repented, came to faith and were baptized into the church.

Later, God had to prod him to go and preach to a small group, foreign to him, the family and friends of Cornelius. His sermon there was not long. He was still getting warmed up when the Holy Spirit interrupted by pouring out on all who were there, bringing them to faith. Peter had just mentioned that forgiveness comes through Jesus and that was enough.

Peter should not think that any of the responses were the result of how well he preached or any of his own efforts. Neither should we. God does choose to do share his word through us rather than through angels or visions, but it is always the Holy Spirit that uses that word to do His work in His own way and time.

After all, it is not by any of our own doing that we ourselves are saved, but by Jesus' death and resurrection in our place. And it is not by any of our own doing or choices that we came to faith or received God's spiritual gifts. The Spirit did it all in us by His word and sacraments. This is good. The more God gets all the credit, the more we get all the comfort and confidence. He will do what He wants through us, in us and for us, giving us all we need by His grace.

Please pray for us, praising God for giving us everything by grace,

thanking Him for His constant presence and protection, and asking Him to increase our faith and love.

Some words are starting to become quite familiar to us. "Mungu" is "God." "amini" is "believe," "imani" is "faith," and "amani" is "peace." "Mbingu" is "heaven," "-enyezi" is almighty."

If you can guess what "Baba" means, maybe you can figure out what this is: Namwamini Mungu, Baba Mwenyezi, Mwumba wa mbingu na nchi.

People wonder...

Are there a lot of bugs there?

There are plenty of ants here of various types. More than once they have climbed up in a pant leg while we were walking and surprised us. One night, just as Linda was getting into the shower, we discovered a huge line of them surrounding our bedroom and bath and had to go for help. One of the managers came with a can of spray in each fist and rescued us.

Mosquitoes are not as common right here as in some places and we don't see many during the day. The kind that carry Malaria are active only dusk to dawn but Malaria is not common where we are now.

Bugs in the house are controlled by geckoes and wall spiders which stretch about the size of the palm of a hand. They are good at hiding and so are not usually seen.

The nuisance for us is gnats which swarm around our faces while we are on walks. It could be worse.
