This is about the time that Vance usually gets around to writing an annual Christmas letter, or, more




often,

This has been a year of big changes. We abandoned heavy winter coats as we left the upper Midwest and arrived in Kenya on Jan. 15. After a week at the main office in Nairobi, we went to Iringa, Tanzania, to study Swahili at a rural camp. While we were there, Covid 19 appeared. We finished classes with our teachers on the phone

and then, because of border closures, we stayed there until late August.

Meanwhile, our second grandson was born, the first for our son and his wife. Thanks to

the internet, we may have seen as much of him as Covid would have allowed in the U.S., including his baptism and now crawling. The lockdown happened just in time for our son



Also, this summer, our daughter and family moved from Oklahoma, where her husband taught at a university, to one in Mississippi which fortunately already did some online teaching. Their son is now a kindergartener in a Lutheran school and their daughter is starting to talk.



In August, we traveled across Tanzania into Kenya, to our home at

Matongo Lutheran Theological College. We arrived in time to celebrated Vance's 65th birthday. It is in a beautiful rural spot in the hills between the cities of Kisumu, on Lake Victoria, and

Kericho, a center of the tea growing area. We were able to visit wildlife parks in both Tanzania and Kenya.

We set up housekeeping in a recently built home on campus. Linda now has gardens growing and has adapted to how things are done here, with unpredictable power, water and internet.





Beginning at the end of October, Vance taught two classes, finishing the semester that began last January but was suspended in March. He spent December preparing for the next semester.

Linda has also picked up duties, including playing keyboard for chapel and being "Matron" of the deaconess students.

Meanwhile, it has been interesting to visit nearby rural churches where Vance has been invited to preach. It is always an all-day affair with great hospitality and often "adventurous" roads.

We are very happy here and staying healthy. In this year of big changes, our changeless God has been brought us through them all.

We all miss being with family and friends with the way things are this year but know that Jesus is always with us. This is why he was born, to be our Immanuel. Epiphany reminds us He is the Savior of all nations, including those where we live and serve. We look forward to when we are all gathered together again with Him in heaven.

How do people celebrate Christmas and New Year's there?

We have learned just a bit about this. We have not seen any signs of decorations at homes or special events, but people do say they enjoy Christmas and have mentioned presents. Malls in big cities are decorated with Santa displays and lights. Of course, there is no snow or any of the traditions that go with that.

Advent services are not a thing here because people don't go out at night. What is common in December is "parish synods." People from several congregations come together for a long weekend of teaching by visiting pastors and choirs singing. Vance taught at one nearby.

We were in Nairobi for Christmas itself. The Lutheran cathedral church there was well attended on Christmas Day. It had a lighted tree in the sanctuary

It seems common to have a big service on New Year's Day. The bell at the church here rang at 5 am and again at 5:30. Yes, that is not a misprint: 5 am. We weren't ready.
