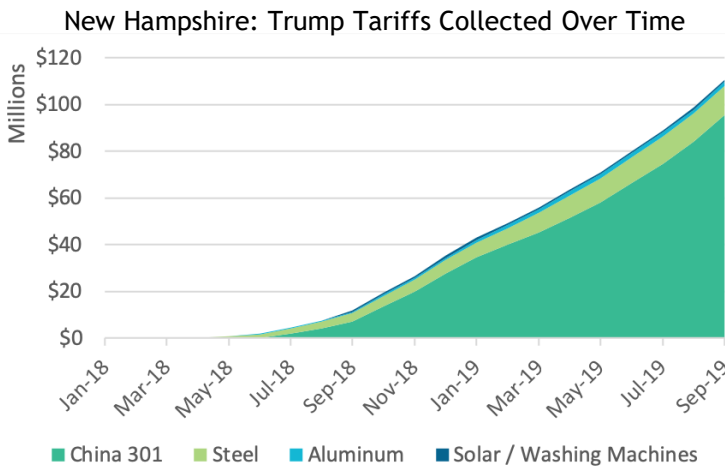

THE LATEST NUMBERS: NEW TARIFFS HITTING NEW HAMPSHIRE ECONOMY HARD

- According to the most recent data, New Hampshire businesses have paid an extra \$111 million in import taxes on products subject to Trump Administration tariffs, including \$12 million in September.
- Tariffs on China “List 3” goods accounted for \$44 million of the new taxes paid to date. New Hampshire imported \$476 million of “List 4” products in 2018, of which \$346 million started facing additional tariffs of 15% on September 1, and the rest will face additional 15% tariffs starting December 15.
- Since the trade war began, New Hampshire exports have faced \$41 million in new retaliatory tariffs from our trading partners, including \$4.0 million in September. These tariffs make exports less competitive.

President Trump should successfully negotiate with our trading partners and end these costly and harmful tariffs. New Hampshire jobs are on the line.
