

From June 10 to 14, 2022, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 1,320 likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is ±3 percentage points.
