The Urban Studies Program respectfully acknowledges the Halkomelem hənqəminəm and Squamish Skwxwu7mesh Snichim speaking peoples who have inhabited the lands and waters where we study since time immemorial. Too often, the traditions that guide the study of urbanism and cities reflect the same patterns of erasure and injustice to Indigenous peoples as do other traditions and institutions in Canada. We approach Urban Studies with this legacy in mind and commit to carry our share of the ongoing work of Truth and Reconciliation.

Overview

We are an interdisciplinary program at Simon Fraser University (SFU) in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. Located at the Vancouver campus, the program has:

- Strong application, enrollment and graduation numbers, with success from a diversity of disciplinary backgrounds, cities or origin and areas of expertise
- Accessibility to students with diverse backgrounds and needs, via engaging seminars, evening classes, part-time study options, para-professional and paracurricular enrichment, co-op work program, a transfer program and accelerated master's option
- An exceptional opus of academic, applied and engaged research, attracting external funding from SSHRC, CMHC, the Pacific Institute for Climate Solutions, Lincoln Institute for Land Policy, Real Estate Foundation of BC, Bullitt Foundation, and more
- Award-winning faculty members, earning recognition within SFU including the Excellence in Teaching and President's Award for Leadership in Sustainability, and writing, speaking, acting in various positions of significance
- An excellent track record of graduates assuming high-impact roles as mayors, political strategists, senior planners, non-profit founders and leaders, development professionals and other kinds of changemakers, some of whom have gone on to obtain a PhD from the Universities of Toronto and Victoria and Clark University, among others
- A network of 250 graduates of the MURB degree and GDUS who actively engage with and mentor our students
- Significant positive impact across our home region of Metro Vancouver, and increasingly, worldwide
- A bridge from undergraduate to graduate studies through the accelerated master's program, with more undergraduate offerings planned

Our nine core faculty members have joint appointments in Political Science; History; Gender, Sexuality and Women's Studies; Geography; Resources and Environmental Management; and Public Policy. Our interdisciplinarity is further showcased through the knowledge and experience of our associate faculty and adjunct professors, who have been drawn from across SFU and the urban professions. Collectively, they have significant expertise and leadership in the areas of Indigenous planning, urban design and architecture, urban data analytics, urban philosophy, climate action advocacy, criminology and legal geography, and the humanities.

The program is further enhanced by its engaged student body, active alumni network and committed staff.

We exemplify SFU's strategic vision "to be the leading engaged university defined by its dynamic integration of innovative education, cutting-edge research and far-reaching community engagement".





The Graduate Program

The challenges and opportunities facing Canadian and international cities are primarily social, political and economic ones, even if their consequences and potential solutions include technical, design and environmental dimensions. That is why we greatly value and benefit from our embeddedness in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.



What is SFU Urban Studies?

We are a multi- and interdisciplinary meeting place that addresses critical urban issues through engaged education and research.

Our faculty members supervise approximately 80 graduate students across two credentials: a master's degree and graduate diploma. We prepare students for urban careers in government and the private and non-profit sectors. The coursework-based graduate diploma engages students in theoretical and applied reflection on topics crucial to cities and urbanity today. The Master of Urban Studies (MURB) degree combines intensive coursework and independent research.

Over the last six years, our enrollments have grown by 35%.

Our seminars average 14 students per class. Normally, our core faculty devote some of their teaching time each year to another disciplinary department, and all supervise master's research. This results in our faculty members having among the highest supervisory loads at the university (averaging 6-10 supervisees each). We are proud to provide high-quality graduate education, as is demonstrated by student satisfaction, the career success of our graduates and the high level of ongoing alumni involvement in our program.

Faculty, alumni, and students work hard with our partners to mobilize our research and contributions to both the study and practice of Urban Studies. We publish a quarterly newsletter that includes updates of student and alumni contributions to the field of urban studies. In 2020, we launched a YouTube channel (@SFU Urban Studies) that hosts videos of some of our public events. In 2019, we launched a podcast, Temporarily Urbane, discussing new urban careers and research.

In 2016, we launched a "Research Summaries" database of students' thesis research. For a full listing of MURB theses, see http://summit.sfu.ca/collection/174. To paraphrase SFU's strategic vision, we equip students with the knowledge, skills, and experiences that prepare them to make cities work better in an ever-changing and challenging world.

Our Curriculum

We model learner-centred graduate education. Our program is designed to allow for part-time and full-time study, with most classes held in the evening at SFU Vancouver's Harbour Centre building. Our curriculum covers a range of critical urban issues in depth, allowing students the flexibility to engage with the topics that most interest and inspire them. Courses are offered in fall, spring and summer terms. Elective courses include:

We also offer professional development seminars, and require master's students to take a research methods course, thesis prospectus course, and research project course.


Places of Origin of Students and Faculty in Urban Studies

Profile of Student Research¹

A sample of 118 MURB theses defended and submitted to SFU's library between 2010-2019 demonstrates the breadth and depth of our research profile.

Place-based research is dominant, with 83% of theses containing a field site in one or more cities. The most popular city of focus is Vancouver itself, accounting for half of the theses reviewed. Including the other municipalities in Metro Vancouver shows that 78% of theses relate to urbanism in the Lower Mainland of BC. The remaining 22% have field study sites elsewhere in BC, elsewhere in Canada, in the USA, or elsewhere in the world (Lima, St. Lucia, and Iran in this sample).

The major focus of these theses can be classified into four thematic groups: city-building (44%), cities in transition (41%), urban governance (29%), and urban mobility (27%). Within each of these themes, some more granular topics and trends emerge.

From this sample of theses, the diversity of the Urban Studies research profile reflects the strength of our interdisciplinary approach and represents a significant contribution to advancing urban research.







2015 • Stephanie Allen Recognized for her research and advocacy concerning the displacement of Vancouver's Black Community through the destruction of Hogan's Alley.

2020 • Dionne Co Awarded due to her experience and passion for working with vulnerable people in Metro Vancouver and volunteer leadership for grassroots urban justice organizations.
