
Background

- Attorney since 2011, licensed in Ohio, Kentucky (inactive), District Court for the Southern District of Ohio, and Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals
- Hired in 2012 to manage Cincinnati's chronic nuisance ordinance
- Prosecuted more than 150 nuisance cases in court and almost 1000 chronic nuisance cases, including largest nuisance receivership in Ohio history
- Argued before Ohio Supreme Court
- Oversees crime-related nuisance prosecution, chronic nuisance enforcement, and liquor enforcement
- Managed the Code Enforcement Response Team and Landlord Training Program
- Helped establish Cincinnati's Place-Based Investigations of Violent Offender Territory (PIVOT) strategy that won 2017 Herman Goldstein Award
- Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy certified trainer





Organization of Crime Places



How do you find the owner?

- Court Records
- Utility Records
- Local Rental/Owner Registrations
- Property Transfer Records
- Collections Databases (LexisNexis)
- State Secretary of State Business
 Registrations



Cooperative

Focuses on collaboration and problem solving with property owners and managers who are willing to take steps to help reduce crime

Non-Cooperative

Owners and managers who are reluctant or unwilling to reduce crime



Strategies for Collaborative Working Relationships

When you learn a place manager's motives and barriers to collaboration, you can more effectively communicate and influence their behavior:

- Convenience
- Money
- Lack of Understanding
- Cultural Differences
- Fear
- Community pressure



- Blame the police
- Blame the neighborhood
- Selective enforcement
- Discrimination
- Gentrification

EVALUATE	Locate stakeholders and allies
ANALYSIS	— Listen and gather information. Assess the physical environmental.
WORK WITH STAKEHOLDERS	Communicate the plan to stakeholders, try to instill ownership of the problem and build the solution together.
ENFORCE	Those who won't participate or follow through, take action.

Strategies for Nuisance

LEGAL SOLUTIONS

Injunctions

Designed to eliminate the harm to the public:


- Padlock the premises
- Abate the nuisance
- Cooperate with police

- Report crime
- Appointment of Receiver

Criminal and Civil Penalties

To punish and deter offensive conduct:

- Jail
- Fines/Damages
- Loss of licenses
- Loss of property



ENFORCEMENT

What do I need to prove?

Learn the prerequisites

What do I want?


Changes to people's actions (management) and/or the physical environment

Who do I want it from?

Identify those who control whether the changes happen

Is there anything I need to prove the case or understand the problem?

Create list of additional sources of information




Tools for Nuisance Abatement

Nuisance actions are unique:

- Public nuisance law protects public rights, not private rights
- Public nuisance traditionally focused on the existence of a <u>harm or injury</u>, <u>not the</u> defendant's conduct

But in the American system:

- Focus is on defendant's conduct, not the harm
- Suit can be brought by private parties, not just public authority
- Damages



What are they? Permission from the government to engage in some kind a highly regulated conduct such as the sale of liquor, operation of rental housing, vending, food preparation, etc.

Pros:

- Usually applicable to the licensee's activity
- May create useful tools, such as the ability to inspect without a warrant (check your local law)

Cons:

- Can be slow, lengthy administrative process with appeals
- Loss of license is punitive and does not abate the problem




Laws that exist to ensure the protection of the public, such as building codes, fire codes, health codes, litter/dumping, etc.

Pros:

- Usually applicable
- Can quickly produce a result

Cons:

- No control over enforcement
- Compliance may not reduce crime




NUISANCE ORDINANCES Ordinances directly targeted at reducing criminal activity in a place, such as chronic nuisance ordinances that target repeat calls for police service, "drug free" housing regulations that require zero tolerance of any drug offense in rental units, anti-loitering laws, or drug/prostitution exclusion zones

Pros:

- Directly targets the problem activity
- Can be easily and quickly employed

Cons:

Can violate federal law if not applied judiciously



Fair Housing Act


Disproportionately impacting a protected class with fines or eviction

Violence Against Women Act

Punishing the victim of crime (domestic or dating violence) to discourage reporting

Americans with Disabilities Act

Retaliating against individuals who are disabled for minor criminal violations or repeatedly calling the police

DOCUMENT, DOCUMENT, DOCUMENT


DON'TS

PUNISH VICTIMS OR REPORTERS OF CRIME

ASK/TELL LANDLORDS TO EVICT WITHOUT EVIDENCE

ASK/TELL LANDLORDS TO SCREEN OUT RESIDENTS FOR ANY CRIME OR ARREST

FOCUSING ON REDUCING
THE HARM, NOT
SUPPRESSING REPORTING
OR PUNISHING A VICTIM,
WILL STEER YOU CLEAR OF
MOST LEGAL

















Roselawn Offenses: 2011-2 vs 2014-5
